## Adults-Teens Basketball Game to Help Ailing Student

(February 25, 2006) — An annual basketball game between the Churchville-Chili Leo Club and Churchville Lions Club has a special significance this year with donations going to an ailing Churchville-Chili student.

The eighth annual event on March 5 will honor Daniel Myslivecek, a sophomore at Churchville-Chili High School who was diagnosed in 2004 with stage IV metastatic melanoma, a rare skin cancer among teenagers. Melanoma usually occurs in older adults and is often associated with exposure to the sun. He was given until the end of January to live and has already beaten those odds.

"He's one of the students in the high school that our club kids know. He has struggled and we wanted to be part of helping the family in any way," said Martin Molinari, who plays the dual role of Leo Club adviser and Lions Club coach.

The Lions Club members are community residents, while the Leo Club has about 50 seventh- through 12th-grade Churchville-Chili students.

In the past, donations have gone to organizations such as the American Diabetes Association and Churchville-Chili teachers.

Nicole Bauer, 13, an eighth-grader at Churchville-Chili Junior High, knows Daniel because her older brother plays soccer with him. "Daniel and his family are trying hard to make it and we want him to get better," said Nicole.

DeAnna Klapp, 15, a sophomore at Churchville-Chili High School, had a few classes with Daniel at Fairbanks Elementary School years ago. "We felt if we chose a local person, more people would want to get involved and they will know where the money is going," said DeAnna.

The students have spent February raising money through donations from community members and businesses. In addition, the Lions Club will make a \$250 donation.

"We hope there are lots of people in the community who want to come to the game, support us with funds and cheer us on," said Molinari.

## Greece Ridge Lions

The **Batavia Lions Club** ran a very successful Lions Club Basketball Tournament, drawing approximately 2,000 fans during the two nights. At the tournament, a 50/50 raffle raised \$405 for the family of a local boy with leukemia. The club co-hosted, with T. F. Brown's restaurant, a Christmas dinner attended by 220 people and distributed toys to over 100 children at the dinner. Club members rang the bells for the Salvation Army on December 2 and 3, raising \$1,378.42 in the two days. Since 1990, Batavia Lions bell ringers have raised \$19,397.17. The club bought and distributed 34 food baskets and 39 blankets for local families in need, and paid for eye exams or glasses for four local people.

The **Greece Ridge Lions Club** held a very successful, but not very snowy, Snow Golf Tournament on February 4. Through participation and hole sponsors, over \$1000 was raised. Dan Smith of Channel 9 R News was the winner with a low score of 30, and Lion Mel Youngjohn won a prize for the longest drive.
